"The Pilgrimage Continues"

Dear Church,

Like many pastors, Jeff and I heaved a huge sigh of relief when we left the church after Easter Sunday worship knowing that we'd made it through Lent. Halleluiah! For pastors, Lent can be a bit exhausting.

Don't misunderstand me; I don't dislike Lent. It's is my second favorite church season just behind Pentecost (which is much shorter). In addition to managing church activities of the Lenten season, I also commit to spending even more time with God during Lent. I enjoyed the daily morning, midday, and evening prayers my course of study class agreed to do during Lent. They were different than the prayers I usually do—and so far I've continued to use them. I loved how "The Sanctuary for Lent" devotional our church did based on the lectionary readings took me deeper into the scriptures. I made it through the marathon of scripture reading during Holy Week in the lectionary reading challenge! The Walk to the Cross Experience helped me to feel more deeply the sacrifice Jesus made for **my** sin. If pilgrimages are meant to bring us closer to God, my Lenten journey did. I hope yours did too.

As I pointed out in the March newsletter, our entire Christian life is a journey toward God. That means our journey doesn't end on Easter Sunday. Our post-Easter worship series is called "BFF" (that stands for "Best Friend Forever" for you older folks). In his Easter Sunday message Pastor Jeff asked the congregation: "What are you looking for?" He said if you're looking for bad news, spend time on social media or watching the news on television. But if you are looking for Good News, look for Jesus. I hope our Lenten journey showed us new ways to seek Him—and that we don't stop looking for Jesus as we move past Easter. The BFF worship series should help (and help us to brush up on some Castaway trivia too).

Christians are "Easter People." Vinita Hampton Wright notes, "Easter is not magical. It is transcendent. Jesus is not somewhere else. Christ is everywhere—through him all creation holds together. He lives and breathes through his body, the Church. So what does it mean to live as

Easter people? It means we live as a people, all parts of Christ's Body working together toward a single purpose: love." As we continue the journey, I pray we will continue looking for Jesus and seeking to love Him and love others more each day.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

The "2020" General Conference will meet from April 23-May 3 in Charlotte, North Carolina with 852 delegates representing 54 annual conferences and 130 countries. The bishops of the church convene the conference but have "neither voice nor vote" in the proceedings (April 2 Webinar led by INUMC Bishop Trimble). Delegates were selected at Annual Conference Session.

Pastor Cathy will send out a link to where you can find more information about the resolutions, proposals, and legislation the **GC** (General Conference) is expected to consider. There is A LOT of it and not everything will end up being discussed. If the **GC** votes to make changes in the *Book of Discipline*, 2/3 of the "aggregates of each Annual Conference" must ratify any constitutional changes. In other words, don't expect any quick or immediate changes! The chair of the Indiana delegation to GC, Russ Abel, a conference superintendent from the south part of the state, and Dr. Aleze Fullbright, a conference superintendent from the central part of the state, are hosting Facebook live sessions leading up to General Conference (go to the INUMC Facebook page and click on "More" and then "Videos" at the top of the page). The delegation also plans to report what's happening during their time in Charlotte and immediately afterwards.

Rev. Abel said the Indiana delegations has decided that one of their goals for **GC** is that the people they encounter would see Jesus Christ in them. Bishop Trimble encouraged us all to keep our mission to "Make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world" in front of us as

we move through this season. Pastors Jeff and Cathy plan to do just that. We also ask that you would pray for the Indiana delegates leading up to and during General Conference. Pastor Cathy knows many of them personally. Pray for wisdom and focus as they read through the legislation proposals, to be open to the leading of the Holy Spirit, and to be representatives of Christ in all they say and do. Pray that they would have endurance and stamina to endure the long days at General Conference—and that they would also enjoy the worship and connectional fellowship of United Methodists from around the world.


## God Moments: "A God Sky" by Becky Geyer

I grew up in the 1950's when stores, restaurants, and businesses were all closed on Sunday. Everyone I knew attended church services and my family rarely missed church because my mom, dad, and grandpa were Sunday School teachers.

I remember one Saturday evening when my dad was preparing to teach his Sunday school class the next morning. It was one of the few times I ever saw him cry. He called my mom, brother, sisters, and me to the kitchen table and began reading portions of a book called, *The Day Christ Died*. Soon, we were all crying with him as he read. Crucifixion was the most agonizing,

he read. Crucifixion was the most agonizing, painful, and humiliating death sentence carried out by Roman soldiers. The nails, the crown of thorns, and especially the cross forever reminds us of that day long ago when "mankind unknowingly sacrificed" the Son of God. The cross is our sacred reminder of that day, whether we wear it, hold it, or display it in our homes.

Some here at Tyner have already shared their "cross stories" (see the March 2024 newsletter) and I've been invited to share mine. It happened one day as evening approached. I



Months later, I talked to a friend who had photographed an eagle. We decided to share our best photos the next week. A group of ladies had gathered at church to quilt and asked to see our photos too. When I opened my scrapbook, I told them it was my favorite sunset and I called it a "God Sky" because it was so unique. You can imagine my surprise when one of my friends pointed to it and said, "Oh! Look at the cross!" (What?? I thought. I was ashamed I hadn't seen it.) Then, another said, "Look! There is the face of God!: Everyone said, "Where?" As they took turns looking more closely, someone else said excitedly, "Jesus is hanging on the cross!!" Another said, "I see a dove!" Still another said, "I see an angel." There were others like me that had missed everything at first glance; but once they were pointed out, we all agreed it was a miraculous sunset from God.

How had I photographed a "God Sky" and missed everything, including the cross? I think God had a lesson for me. First, God knows how to humble me. Second, God reveals Himself to each of us in His own way and in His own time. God also strengthens our faith when we stand side by side together and share His insights and revelations with each other.

**Note from Pastor Cathy**: I've scanned the photo to include here, but will also post it on one of the bulletin boards at church so that people can see it better (and see if you can find the cross). Copies will be available for anyone who'd like one. Each month I'd like to post a "formal" God Moment on the bulletin board and also offer opportunities for everyone in church to share more informal God moments they experience that month. As Becky says in her last line: God strengthens our faith when we stand side by side and share His insights and revelations with each other.






#### WALK TO THE CROSS EXPERIENCE

Once they did, we offered them a smooth rock with a cross etched in it to take with them.
